The promise of permanence, such as in marriage, helps create an environment of security. But, as we will see in the story of Ruth, God continues to love us and is with us even as our family and home situations change.

READ & DISCUSS: Ruth 1 – 4 or "Ruth and Naomi" starting on page 152 of *The Beginner's Bible*

- What three people died in this story?
- After these men had died, the women wouldn't be able to have regular jobs to get food. They needed husbands for that. Where did Naomi tell Ruth to go so she would be taken care of?
- What did Ruth tell Naomi?
- Since she couldn't get a job, what did Ruth do to get food for herself and Naomi to eat?
- Who was the good man who was helping make sure Ruth had plenty of food?
- Ruth married this good man. Together, they had a baby boy what was the baby's name?
- From the time that the men died, what are all the ways God helped take care of Ruth and Naomi?
- Can you think of a time that God helped take care of your family?
 - Do you think God ever had a friend, family member, neighbor, co-worker, or even stranger bring help to your family?
 - o Did you ever help another family when they were having a difficult time?
 - God wants to use us to help meet the needs of others!

<u>MEMORIZE</u>: Deuteronomy 7:9, "Know therefore that the LORD your God is God, the faithful God who keeps covenant and steadfast love with those who love him and keep his commandments, to a thousand generations," -OR SHORTER OPTION -

Idea #2: Where Did That Word Go?

Write or type the Bible verse onto a sheet of paper. Cut the words apart. Tape the words to a wall or table. Have your child say the verse out loud, then remove one word. Have your child say the verse again, seeing if they can remember the missing word. Repeat, until all of the words are gone.

- Draw or paint a picture of your family.
- Make a family tree use the blank one enclosed or make your own!
- Make a Shoebox (or other box) Diorama of the Story of Ruth:
 - Dioramas are great for reinforcing a story. Items and pictures are gathered and used to create a 3 dimensional display depicting the story you are learning about. Decorating the walls, ceiling and floor inside a box makes a scene come alive. Small toys can be used inside the box or simple stand-up figures can be created out of folded paper. The diorama concept is what is often seen in the display cases at museums
 - Some item ideas: Grain, travel stuff, wedding items, baby doll

Life Enrichment


What about this week's session challenged, encouraged, or disturbed you?
